#### Producers Have Quicker Methods Available For Palpation Results

Historically, producers have used palpation and ultrasound to determine the pregnancy status of their breeding animals. Recently producers were provided with a new option, blood-based pregnancy testing. In the last eight years the BioPRYN cattle test has increased to nearly 670,000 samples annually and surpassed two million total samples in May, 2010.


BioPRYN, a blood-based technology, has been commercially available to producers since 2002. BioPRYN is a laboratory test, accurate at 30 or more days post-breeding, less invasive and less expensive than palpation and ultrasound, and is user friendly. A producer or veterinarian can draw the blood from the cow and send it to the nearest laboratory running the ELISA test.


The blood sample for the BioPRYN test can be taken easily from the tail vein after minimal instruction, making it an easy alternative that does not require specialized training or extensive experience. BioPRYN can be used as soon as 30 days after breeding or 25 days post implant (32 days of embryonic age) using embryo transfer. Because there is residual PSPB from the previous pregnancy, blood can be drawn once cows are 90 days or more post-partum. Test results are available 27 hours after receipt of the sample and are sent out to producer by fax, phone, or e-mail. Now there is even a more advanced test that provides results the same day






### Strack Farms Restaurant

## Always A

Strack Farms has been in the Simbrah business since 1983, but this family has always been involved in agriculture and the business of feeding consumers.

The family operation, which today includes Ernie and brother Don, and Don's sons, Keith and Kent, can trace their roots back to Germany and agriculture. Their family established themselves in Spring, Texas upon arriving in this country in 1845 and began farming.

"Our generation started by raising produce and selling it from the farm at our own produce stand. Then we began selling our vegetables commercially to local food businesses. We raised almost everything, but of course sweet corn and tomatoes were high demand items. In addition, we always had commercial cattle," explains Ernie, adding that with their location just under two hours from the coast, they could raise some vegetables twice in the year.

Then in the early 70's, Houston started moving in their direction.

"In the beginning there wasn't that much out here, except the builders for the subdivisions and shopping centers, so we added a bar-be-que stand and began selling sandwiches, as we saw a market that needed to be filled," says Keith.

Their family produce stand had also evolved over the years and by this time was an 8,000 foot, air-conditioned building.

"The city just kept moving out closer and closer and that brought a lot of regulations for our produce farming. It became difficult to drive the equipment on the road and farm on the fringes of the Houston city limits," says Keith.

The produce stand became Strack Farms Restaurant in the mid 70's and Don and Keith began looking for land away from Houston.


"Don and I started looking for land first in the Brenham area, but that had already become a very popular area. Then we found this property near Normangee. It reminded us of how Spring looked early on, and the location was great, as we're just five miles from Interstate 45," describes Ernie.

Today the family owns close to 1,200 acres in the Normangee area and uses it to run their purebred Simbrah herd and raise hav.

They first stocked the land with commercial cattle, but Ernie was impressed with the Simmental cattle he had seen at what was then Miraflores Ranch, in Brenham. Then they began hearing about Simbrah, largely because of promotion efforts of people like the late John Joyce, Brent Perry and others.

"I was intrigued by the Simbrah cattle. I knew from raising vegetables that F1 crosses were far superior. Crossing lines in vegetables had started in the late 1960's as there was no comparison between a crossbred cucumber and a straightbred cucumber," explains Keith

Brahmans with Simmentals that were of Fleckvieh breeding.

"We bought those first Simbrah in 1983 and registered our first calf in 1984. Then we added some cattle from Granada Genetics and did some embryo work there to increase our numbers. The first bull we purchased was a purebred bull from S Bar W Ranch, in Woodville, Texas, "remembers Keith.

Today their number has about 120 producing females as the recent droughts have forced them to decrease their herd from the 200 head they were running. They have made select purchases over the years, but have elected primarily to build their herd through their own breeding.

They did buy one cow from Tom and Dianne Risinger that continues to make an impact in their herd.

"She was the best cow I ever bought and she was a Simmental. We have kept a number of her daughters and one in particular, Miss Strack J45. She has produced a number of herd sires, including the 2010 Reserve Grand International Champion Bull for the Vayon family," says Keith, adding that they are using one of her sons in their program, and so are breeders, Bill Wentz and Martin Roberts.

"We have had to endure the periods when the industry was criticizing Brahmans, then criticizing Simmentals because they were too big and the latest knock was that

Strack Farms is one of the longest running continuous herds in the breed and the Strack family doesn't see that changing.


anything that is not black isn't any good. But we have found the cattle do well and they perform. If they didn't, we still wouldn't be raising them, 28 years later," stresses Emie.



## Do-It-Yourself Cattle Photography Think outside the box and you can do it!

Remember the last time you were photographed by a professional? The photographer, armed with a very large camera and an odd array of lighting equipment, positioned you in front of a pleasing backdrop. All you had to do was follow directions, try not to blink, and look happy.

While you might have been thinking about how your hair looked, the photographer was adjusting his camera settings, imagining how to position you according to your physical characteristics and personality, moving the lighting angle...thinking outside the box.

It's much the same with cattle photography. There's a lot to consider before you ever click the camera. While hiring a reputable professional livestock photographer (emphasis on "livestock") is always the safest route to ensure the best promotional photos, you can take them yourself if you follow a few guidelines. I believe there are four essential P's for the do-it-yourselfer to remember:

- 1. Preparation
- 2. Psychology
- 3. Position
- 4. Patience

You may note I didn't include the obvious requirement – the camera. The truth is, almost any of the familiar brand digital cameras on the market will produce high quality images. However, some pocketbook-friendly models, with interchangeable lenses, stand out from the pack, such as the Pentax K200D, Nikon D80 and Canon Rebel. The lens is more important than the choice of camera body. Always use a telephoto lens (I use a Nikkor 55-200 ml) to eliminate any distortion of your subject and allow you to fill half to three-quarters of your frame while standing at a distance of approximately 30-40 feet. Even compact "point and shoot" cameras with at least 5 megapixels and a 10x optical zoom can produce surprisingly good results.

#### Preparation

Obviously shooting cattle "as is" in the pasture is a different subject, although some of the same principles apply. We'll be referring primarily to photographing multiple individuals, turned out in a confined area, one at a time, for a sale catalog, print ad, or other promotional purpose.

 Cattle. Ideally cattle should be clipped several days prior to photo day, although I've often been photographing one individual while the next in line was being clipped. Availability of labor may make the latter the only alternative. While in the chute, never forget the all-important fly spray!

Clipping a few days in advance allows the hair to lie more naturally as well as give the cattle time to settle. A quick rinse on the morning of your photo shoot, and they'll look their best, provided their body condition is good.



Before: This female was clipped, washed and in ideal body condition. She stood balanced, with legs positioned perfectly and alert, "upheaded" expression showing plenty of extension through her neck. Early marning sun provided a natural spotlight to see plenty of muscle definition. A perfect pose was ruined by the unsightly, distracting background, however.



After: This same female with a clear and unobstructed background. Her hind legs weren't positioned as nicely as in the other photo, but what a difference a pleasing background makes!

2. Facilities. Options are unlimited, and often simply dictated by disposition. Choices range from barbed wire and T-posts to metal panels or mesh type fencing. It's really whatever keeps them in. Size is more critical. Unless you feel like hiking, a pen roughly 60 x 100 works well. Much smaller and the cattle will not only feel pressured and seek an escape route, but you may not have enough distance to get the entire animal into the frame with some telephoto lenses. A large round pen, or a rectangular pen with corners rounded by wire or panels, works exceptionally well.

A word about metal panels: Try to position cattle as far away from them as possible. This will keep the profile of your subject matter more visible, and the panels will appear smaller, thus less distracting. Slope of the pen is also helpful. A smooth ground surface with a slight upward slope and short grass cover is ideal. If your location doesn't have the first two, you can always solve the grass problem. All it takes is a few minutes with any type of mower to clean up a small area. Tall grass and weeds will not only take away from the professional appearance of your photos, but will hide leg structure while making them appear unnaturally short. Always position your cattle heading uphill to enhance the levelness of their top lines.

Know When To Hold 'Em. A small holding pen on one (or both) ends of your photo trap can make the entire photo session go much smoother. An individual turned out alone will be more relaxed with buddies nearby in the holding pens. They will also give him a focus other than the photographer, allowing an easier side shot. One pen can be used for cattle coming in and the other to hold those you've photographed. With pens on both ends, cattle can be photographed from either side and still have a buddy in front to focus his attention on.

Keep It Simple. This can't be stressed enough! No trucks, barns, hay equipment, your son's four-wheeler, or anything else but sky and grass. It also means no trees nearby for black and dark red cattle. Why? If close enough to your animal, dark trees will tend to blend in and distract, especially on a partlycloudy day. However, they can also serve to provide a nice backdrop to make white or light-colored cattle stand out.

Line Up Your Help. Consider photo day like a game of chess. A move by one player (handler) determines the move of his opponent (the animal). The goal is to always keep your advantage, thus keep the game short. One handler doesn't usually work well. Two is better. Three is best. Any more is actually not a good idea, if your pen is set up correctly and the cattle are calm and cooperative. Too many people in a pen can spell confusion and make cattle more nervous. Make sure your help is available, know what to do and where to stand before photo day.

#### **Psychology**

The game is played with the photographer at the side of the animal, one handler fractious individual for
in front of the animal to slow his motion, one behind to push
forward and a third to only act when the subject stops in the
correct position for shooting. His job is to stand slightly to the
side of the handler in front and "get ears," meaning to get the
head up and ears forward by any means possible. (The handler
in front can actually do this if a third person is not available.)

The "ear" person is critical in that he can either spook the



In this case, the camera person stood too far to the heifer's hindquarters. Although the near side hind leg was back, the photographer's position made the hind legs appear to be "coming out of the same hole," as the saying goes. She was clean and in good body condition. Her head was up nicely with ears forward and an alert expression. But what a difference it would have made to move her to the center of the pen, away from the fence... and the comer posts... and the trees... and the white pipe fence! Granted, most cattle like to hug any available fence, but that's where a little patience pays off. Eventually, they will stop away from the fence. You've taken the effort to sart and pen this individual. Take a few more moments to position her with the least amount of distracting elements in the photo.



Just because her near side hind leg was back, doesn't mean this heifer looked her best. She didn't have full weight on her right hind leg and appears as though it was too close (width wise) to the other leg. Obviously, she was far too thin to photograph. Even if her head had been higher and she wasn't positioned downhill, her body condition should have barred her from the photo pen and back to the feed bunk.



Cattle don't always respect psychology! If you'll put an individual back with his buddles to settle, and save him for last, he might be a little more cooperative the next time. Some cattle need more space and less people in the pen to feel more comfortable. As a last resort, a gentle bull could be turned out with a more fractious individual for reassurance.

animal away, or make him look alert and photogenic. When an animal stops in a good position for photographing, there are literally a few precious seconds before he'll move again. Within those seconds, the third handler must be able to read an individual and use whatever method works best to get his attention. A nervous, flighty animal may need nothing more than the sight of this person. Quiet cattle may require the person to wave a sack, bawl like a calf, do cartwheels or make some strange sounds. It's not a job for the easily embarrassed, and oh, so important,

A savvy handler will be focused on the animal and ready to act without being told, and only when the photographer gives the signal that the animal is standing correctly. If the "ear" person repeatedly attempts to get the animal's attention when he stops, but is in the wrong position, it only serves to numb the bull or female to the noise. There are times when it may work better to be perfectly quiet and still, and let the animal listen to a faint sound or movement in the distance. If an object is used, such as placing a hat or cap on the end of a show stick, the higher he can raise it in the air, the better. The challenge is reading the animal and adapting your methods to his personality and disposition.

Most Common Mistake. We all know an animal's ears move toward movement or noise, whether that movement or noise is in front, behind or to the side. Why then, do any of us make noise behind an animal to make him put his ears forward! It's a common mistake I think we've all made. Even the squeak of a saddle from behind can put those ears back. It's important for everyone to be still and let the "ear" man do his work when the time's right.

Less is More. Slower Is Faster. Turn one bull in a pen by himself with three or four people on foot or horseback, and any cow person knows what will happen. The animal will usually come out running, explore his boundaries, make sure he can't go out the way he came in, and then stop and size up the situation. Then he's off to do it all over again. Let him work off some steam, calm down, realize no one's going to harm him, and only then begin to work him back and forth between two handlers. No sudden movements, hand waving or loud voices if

possible. Just very, very slow movements, depending on the nature of the animal. Often, the slower you move, and the less you pressure an individual, the more often he will stop and the faster you'll get that perfect pose!

Every unhaltered animal has an imaginary "bubble" of space. One step within that space and they'll move. You can direct their shoulders away or toward you, or their body forward or back-

ward, by a slight movement of your own body. Knowing the parameters of that space, and when to stop and release pressure on them by stopping your own body movement, can be key to positioning them correctly.

#### Position

- Cattle Position. The classic pose for a beef cattle photo is always with the near side rear leg farther back than the offside rear leg. Front legs should be closer together (laterally). Head and neck up, ears forward and looking either forward or slightly turned toward the photographer.
- 2. Your Position. Draw a line directly from the center of the animal's body as he stands perpendicular to you. Never step toward the front of the animal from that line. In fact, step a little toward the rear, especially when shooting a heavier-fronted bull or female. Either kneel or bend slightly, depending on the animal's height. A young calf will always look better when photographed from a kneeling position. A taller, mature individual may look better with a slightly higher position, but never stand erect and shoot downward.
- 3. Light Position. Always strive to take photos on a sunny day, although this is not always possible. Treat the sun as your subject's spotlight. High noon in the summer is the worst time of the day to shoot, as your "spotlight" is shining directly on the animal's back. Shadows will be harsh and his side will be dark. Early morning or late afternoon will provide the best light. Always shoot with the sun at your back and directly on the side of the animal. Above all, look beyond your subject, and make sure the background is as clear and uncluttered as possible.

I'd have to title this photo "every which way but right." There is a nice helfer amid the maze of lines, and she really does have a neck. This photo definitely doesn't do her justice. Looks like there's a nicer area outside the pens for this photo. If this was the only available area, there is still a quick fix. The photographer should move the helfer to the center of the pen, as for away from the panels as possible, yet still have the sun behind his back and directly on the side of the female. He should move from the front of the helfer, to the center of her body, and then move sideways one or two steps further toward her hip. Instead of standing erect, he should kneel on one knee and wait until she looked straight ahead with both ears forward. If there is no help available, the photographer should be as still as possible and an animal will usually look at something ahead. Last, it's best to fill at least one-half to three-quarters of your frame with the animal. Allow a little "air" around the animal for cropping.

#### **Patience**

Don't hesitate to take plenty of shots until you are sure you've got a great one. This may mean spending an hour on one individual, or a few minutes. Stay at the animal's side as he moves around the pen, prepared to kneel and shoot. He may only stop in the correct position for an instant, before moving again. If he does stand with feet in the correction position, he still may not look his best. Look for overall balance, level top line, weight on all four legs, and alert appearance.

Even if you're limited to just one helper, or none at all, remember to have your cattle clean and sprayed for flies, find a place with a clear, uncluttered background, and position them (and yourself) correctly with the sun directly on their side. Be prepared, with everything in position, and use a little bovine



Nice heifer. Too bad, because she could have taken a terrific photo. This is a classic example of a distracting background. Great promo for galvanized metall The photographer could have also positioned himself farther toward this heifer's hindquarters and waited until her head was turned slightly more forward to show extension through her neck. If she had been standing on an incline, all the better.



Unfortunately, this photo exhibits everything a photographer should NOT do. Harsh shadows near her loin area draw you to that spot. Midday sun was directly over her back, causing her sides to be silhouetted, thus muscle definition obscured. Her near side hind leg was forward instead of back. Ears were not forward and she didn't have an alert, "upfronted" appearance. She should be positioned on a slight incline. A clear background may not be an option, but the farther you can position a black animal from trees, the more the animal will stand out.

## **Young Leaders**

#### **By Martha Hollida Garrett**

Every organization sees change as new challenges arise in the industry. A younger generation of Simbrah breeders have chosen to be part of the future and face those challenges. Most have family ties to the breed with lots of memories tied to showing Simbrah cattle. They not only have chosen the cattle, but they are assuming responsibility for the breed as they take on leadership roles at all levels. Welcome to our second installment on young leaders of the Simbrah breed.



#### **Victor Guerra**

Guerra doesn't remember a life without Simbrah. Ever since he could remember Simbrah has been a part of the Guerra Bros. cow operation, which later became La Muneca Cattle Co.

"Ever since I was old enough to open gates and feed cubes out of the back of the truck, I have been around registered Simbrah cattle. I showed my first Simbrah in 1988, when I was seven-years-old and continued showing them throughout high school. My parents involved us in the day-to-day operations and the marketing of our Simbrah cattle at a very young age. They encouraged us to be active in junior events," he says.

Guerra, who is now 29-years-old, graduated from Texas A&M University in College Station, Texas in 2004 with a degree in Agriculture Development with an emphasis in beef cattle production. During college, he, his brother, Carlitos and good friend Trey Baring attended many Simbrah events in northeast Texas and Louisiana, including Pine Ridge Ranch's Production Sales and Southeast Simbrah Alliance Association (SESA) events and helped with the cattle at the annual Fall Fest sale in nearby Hearne. In May of 2009, he earned his J.D. from St. Mary's University School of Law in San Antonio, Texas and is now involved with the family ranch.

He has chosen to stay involved with Simbrah, because, he explains, "Several things come to mind, but three that surface to the top quickly are the people and the power and profitability that Simbrah cattle have to offer. I have met many good people during my involvement in this breed and they have played a role in my continued involvement in Simbrah. The power of Simbrah cattle keeps me involved, I believe that Simbrahs have much to offer and they are getting better each and every year. In the last few years, I have begun to invest in some Simbrahs of my own with friends like Louie Flores, Dean Fuchs, Joe Mask, Mark Koehl and Ronnie Smith. Thus far, this venture has proven to be profitable for me and my cattle partners. My dad has always told me, 'You can't go broke making a profit.'"

He assists La Muneca primarily with marketing and promotion. He is responsible for maintaining the website

and assists with the creation of their advertisements. He also likes to hit the road to visit Simbrah breeders and can always be found assisting clients and exhibiting La Muneca cattle at major stock shows. He also works closely with his uncle, Dr. Ernesto Guerra and his manager, Ted Tschirhart with the BETM Simbrah program.

Today, Guerra serves as trustee for the TSSA Educational Trust and attends the State Futurity annually. He is involved with the Simbrah Long Range Plan and was recently appointed to the Texas FFA Foundation Board.

Guerra credits the leadership opportunities of the Texas Junior Simmental/Simbrah Association (TJSSA) and American Junior Simmental Association (AJSA) as being pivotal to his development. He participated in all the contests and encourages young people to take full advantage of these events. He was a TJSSA president and competed in ten State Futurities and six AJSA Classics.



**Scott Willey** 

Like many others, Scott was involved with the Simbrah breed before he was born. His family's interest in the breed started somewhat uniquely.

"In the early 80s, my dad served on a jury for a trial that involved the breed, and this spiked his interest. The following year our first Simmental bull was purchased from Edmund Tom and then later we would begin raising Simbrahs," he explains.

He attended his first TJSSA Futurity at the age of eight and has only missed one in the past 19 years. During this time, he qualified for both junior and senior teams for the AJSA Classic and placed in the top 10 overall on several occasions. In 2003-2004, he led the state organization as president.

Willey spent two years at Palo Alto Community College, compliments of a San Antonio Livestock Exposition Scholarship and then transferred to Texas A&M University-Kingsville, where he graduated Cum Laude with a B.S. degree in Agriculture Business, and two minors in Animal Science and Business Administration. He is enrolled at TAMUK, pursuing a Master's in Agriculture Science.

"The Simbrah breed has many advantages that range from production value to kid value. The breed thrives in

many environments including the hot humid South Texas and Gulf Coast regions where I live. The maternal abilities, growth, adaptability, and versatility are great assets the Simbrah breed can provide to a producer's herd. Also, the youth support the breeders provide is astounding and the educational and leadership development events are unequalled," he says.

"I have been involved in the family operation as long as I can remember. My roles started out primarily showing cattle, and then I became more active in what cattle/genetics were purchased, and assisted with selection of semen for the family operation. I have also purchased a few head of my own and recently I purchased a few embryos with the hope of starting a foundation of some of the best cows in the breed."

Willey stays very involved with the TJSSA as he says that it is just too hard to walk away from an organization that has done so much for him and his family.

Now, 26-years-old, he is currently a county extension agent in Fayette County, Texas and that provides him several opportunities to work with local cattle organizations and events.



Jennifer Freasier Kincaid

Kincaid's entrance into the Simbrah breed also came through the show ring. When she was in seventh grade, her parents moved to the country and purchased a Simbrah heifer for her to show. For a couple of years, she just showed locally and attended the majors. Kincaid said, "I really got hooked the first time I used my own money to buy a Simbrah show heifer from Boening Brothers and my heifer won calf champion at Ft. Worth. We added a couple of nice heifers raised on our ranch, and suddenly I had a winning showstring!"

"Then I heard about the TJSSA from Greg Willey, and he also encouraged me to attend Smith Genetics Junior Camp before the State Futurity. That experience opened a whole new world of learning and personal growth for me. I went to the Futurity and then to the AJSA Classic in Spokane, Washington, where I was High Point Junior Rookie. As a junior, I went on to attend eight TJSSA Futurities, five AJSA Regionals, and seven AJSA National

Classics. I served on the TJSSA Board of Directors as the historian, vice president, and president, and I was an active TJLA member, winning the Simbrah heifer buckle in 2000. I also participated and won the High Point Exhibitor at Simbrah Roundup several times, and I showed in the Simbrah Sensation, Superbowl and SESA shows for a number of years."

"While our ranching operation has not made me wealthy, it has made me rich in many other ways. My family and I have formed lifetime friendships with so many wonderful people because of our association with Simbrah cattle. Raising and showing Simbrah cattle through the TJSSA and AJSA programs dramatically changed my life. It gave me positive direction during those difficult teenage years, and it played a key role in the development of my strong leadership and communication skills."

In 2004, Kincaid graduated with honors from the University of Texas at San Antonio with a BBA in Marketing and in December 2010 she graduated with honors from Our Lady of the Lake University with a Master's degree in Business Administration. Today, she is 28-years-old and married to husband, Craig. They reside near the family's ranch in Floresville, where she is still involved in the cattle operation. In addition, her younger sister, Georgia, is now very involved in the TJSSA and showing Simbrah, so Kincaid frequently helps her and her many friends who show.

"The TJSSA changed my life in so many positive ways, and I vowed to help promote this experience to as many young people as possible. I continued to serve the organization as a volunteer when my junior career was over, and I am currently serving as an advisor to the TJSSA Board of Directors. I gained so much through the TJSSA and I am very grateful for the opportunity to give back to the junior breed association. We really have an amazing group of young people in the TJSSA, and it is truly rewarding to work with them and watch them grow into the leaders of tomorrow," she says.



#### **Roberto Davila**

In 1993, Davila's dad purchased a Simbrah bull from La Muneca Cattle Co. for their commercial cattle program. The calves impressed them, their customers, and added more Simbrah genetics to their herd. Those calves hooked Davila. He showed Simbrahs in high school and handled all the responsibilities himself, including the financing of his own projects. He was very active in FFA and held many leadership positions. He now maintains a small herd of red Simbrah with La Muneca, La Hacienda Hinojosa and Hagan Cattle genetics. He works for Bovine Elite in College Station, Texas, where he assists with international sales, shipping and receiving.

"Simbrah is the breed for the Americas. I like the adaptability, hardiness, fertility and docility of Simbrah. More than 60% of the world's grazing land is where hot weather occurs,

and with their genetic combination, Simbrah produces a great carcass efficiently for the beef industry." says Davila.

Davila moved to College Station in 2006 and around his work schedule is working on B.S. degree in Animal Science with classes at Blinn and Texas A&M University.

"I recently traveled to Panama to visit a Brahman breeder. I spoke to him about breeding his Brahmans to Simmental. I think in a year or two we might see some half bloods in that herd. Within the past two years, I have helped sell Simbrahs to Mexico, Costa Rica, and Guatemala. I am enthused about the Simbrah breed, the juniors and international breeders," he explains.

Davila, who is 23-years-old, can be found at most Simbrah events. He has been a speaker at the Smith Genetics junior camps, and has also helped with MAS and Synergy junior events.

He attends all the open shows in Texas and most of the major junior shows. In addition, he spends considerable time visiting other breeders and evaluating cattle and studying genetic combinations. He is also involved with the Simbrah Long Range Planning group.

Davila is quick to note that he is indebted to many Simbrah breeders who have shared their knowledge with him and taught him a lot about genetics, reproduction, and marketing.

He is always encouraging juniors to become involved with the opportunities provided by TJSSA, AJSA, and other junior agricultural organizations.



#### **Colby Jenkins**

"I became involved with Simbrah in high school, when I started showing heifers. My family has always been involved in the cattle business, but it wasn't until my high school ag teacher encouraged me to enter a calf scramble that I actually decided to start showing heifers.

I bought my first heifer from Shallow Water Ranch, Rising Star, Texas. In fact, most of my genetics go back to that very cow. I was fortunate to raise my own heifers and place in the top three at majors and run in the Top 10 in the Texas Junior Livestock Association (TJLA) with just one heifer. We have been slowly building a herd and I am proud of what we have been able to accomplish with limited resources. We were never able to go out and buy that top notch show prospect, so it encouraged me to try and be the best breeder I could be," he explains.

Colby and his parents, Kim and Nathan Hay, maintain their herd in Central, Texas near Marlin. He is involved with all the management decisions and care of the herd.

"My step-dad and I seem to disagree a lot initially on decisions, but this proves to be valuable to me as it makes me

look at all possibilities from all angles. Along with the females we have raised, we have purchased select lots from Triple S Ranch. Some of the sire lines in their family program include LMC Red Bullet, LMC JW Black, and Hagan McDreamy. They are utilizing some Simmental bulls back on the Simbrah females to produce percentage Simbrah's.

Colby, who is just 22-years-old, graduated from Tarleton State University with a degree in Agricultural Development and a minor in Spanish.

"The Mexican culture has always been intriguing to me. I was fortunate enough to spend a summer studying abroad and traveling in parts of Mexico," he says.

Colby has many reasons on why he is choosing to stay involved with the family cattle program and Simbrah.

"The different ways you can go about breeding a pure-bred Simbrah creates different avenues for developing an animal that is ideal to your situation. I really don't think you can find that versatility with any other breed. Simbrah cows make some of the best mothers you will ever find. They are hearty, docile, produce a lot of milk, and are overall easy keepers. We have something in Simbrah that not many breeds can compete with and that's the junior program. Kids have the opportunity to compete for tons of prizes, money and the leadership opportunities. Simbrah provides youth a chance to gain valuable skills for life. I didn't take advantage of these junior opportunities as much as I should have, but it doesn't keep me from telling young exhibitors today that they need to be involved," he explains.

Jenkins takes an active role with helping the junior customers of KNC Simbrah and is involved with the Long Range Planning Committee of Simbrah.



#### **Reinhard Hagan**

Hagan is involved in not only registered Simbrah, but is strongly involved in the commercial segment of the beef industry through the Hagan family's commercial cow calf operation and co-ownership of the Hallettsville Livestock Auction Co.

"I enjoy all aspects of the cattle business and that probably drove me to stay involved in the family operation the most. I have always had a preference for American breed cattle and I think Simbrah are pretty special. They of course are very heat tolerant, which is a must in our areas, but they are also versatile and work in so many environments. They bring a lot of good things to the commercial seament, which is the founda-
